IMPACT FOR INDUSTRY

- has shown leadership and vision, resulting in meaningful industry impact
- demonstrates outstanding leadership qualities, such as integrity and initiative, mentoring and giving back, dedication and determination, resilience and risk taking, and passion for innovation that has impact.

Our 2023 recipient is Professor Sharon Lewin AO



Professor Sharon Lewin AO is the Director of the Peter Doherty Institute for Infection and Immunity, a joint venture between The University of Melbourne and Royal Melbourne Hospital; Director of the Cumming Global Centre for Pandemic Therapeutics; and Melbourne Laureate Professor at The University of Melbourne.

Sharon is an infectious diseases physician and basic scientist. She trained at Monash University, completing her medical degree in 1986 and PhD in virology in 1997. She went on to a highly productive post-doctoral fellowship with Dr David Ho, Time Magazine's Man of the Year 1996, at Rockefeller University, New York and returned to Melbourne in 1999. Her research focuses on understanding why HIV persists on treatment and developing clinical trials aimed at ultimately finding a cure for HIV infection. Sharon is recognised as a leading global expert in HIV science and is currently President of the International AIDS Society, a global organisation with over 17,000 members.

She played a pivotal role in Australia's response to the COVID-19 pandemic through her leadership of the Doherty Institute, the Australian Partnership for Preparedness Research on Infectious Disease Emergencies (APPRISE) and as Co-chair of the National COVID-19 Health and

Research Advisory Committee. She is widely recognised for her broad expertise in infectious diseases and is currently President of the Scientific Advisory Board to the ANRS-MIE in France.

She has received numerous national and international awards. Highlights include Melburnian of the Year from the City of Melbourne in 2014 and Outstanding Female Researcher Medal from the Australian Academy of Health and Medical Science in 2022.

Sharon is passionate about science communication and community engagement, and provides objective and rational insights on both HIV and COVID-19 to government, national and international media, civil society and the business community.

Our 2023 recipient is Professor Susie Nilsson



Professor Susie Nilsson is the Research Director for the Biomedical Manufacturing program at CSIRO, Australia's national science agency. She oversees the production of new products and processes for the biomedical sector across regulated biomanufacturing, biologics research and development, chemical biology, diagnostics

and devices, and bioactive small molecules and polymers.

Susie has an extensive history in biologics and specifically haematopoietic stem cell research. She completed her PhD at University of Melbourne and post-doctoral studies at the University of Massachusetts prior to taking up a position at the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre, then the Australian Stem Cell Centre. Susie moved to CSIRO in 2009 and was appointed as an Australian Research Council Future Fellow. She became a group leader at the Australian Regenerative Medicine Institute at Monash University in 2013 and a CSIRO Science Leader in 2014.

Some of her notable achievements at CSIRO include overseeing the production of biologics for Phase I clinical trials (including two COVID-19 vaccine candidates and a bioconjugated cancer vaccine), the building of a new cGMP facility for producing products in mammalian systems for

Phase I, II and III clinical trials and the secondment of staff to CSL to assist with the national vaccine production effort to address the COVID-19 pandemic.

Susie is also a renowned speaker in Australia and internationally, has a strong track record of publishing in high impact journals, with over 8130 lifetime citations. She also mentors early-career scientists.

Susie prides herself on seeing her team achieve and enables and supports them to achieve excellent outcomes for industry partners, and accolades for CSIRO research and development.

Our 2023 recipient is Rima Darwiche



Rima Darwiche is the CEO and Founder of Central Pharmacy Logistics Australia (CPL), and a registered pharmacist. She has a Bachelor of Medical Science (Immunology) and Bachelor of Pharmacy, with extensive experience collaborating with pharmaceutical companies and medical researchers across Asia-Pacific, US, Europe, Australia and New Zealand.

Leveraging her skills, Rima embarked on an entrepreneurial journey to found CPL, a TGA and Pharmacy Authority licensed service to give all patients access to life-saving investigational therapies, regardless of geographical location in regional or rural communities – a first of its kind in Australia.

Rima worked with Australian and State Government regulators to establish CPL and place Australia on the international stage for global companies to invest here. CPL's current pipeline includes global companies: Thermo Fisher, Marken UPS and biotechnology companies listed on the NASDAQ and ASX.

Rima serves on several clinical trial advisory committees locally and globally, and represents the Asia-Pacific region for a US clinical regulatory group. Before joining the pharmaceutical industry, she was a medical researcher with over 25 publications in high-impact journals, including

Lancet, Cell and Science. Rima has also advised WEHI on the implementation of clinical trials to translate their research into life-saving therapies. In 2020, she joined the Data Safety Monitoring Board for Orygen Youth Health, which provides specialist mental health services to young people aged 15 to 24 years.

As a child of Lebanese immigrants facing language barriers, financial hardship and limited prospects, Rima wants her story shared with others. She appreciates the second chance to return to Australia after five years abroad during a civil war, resume her education and thrive in a country which is safe and full of opportunity. Rima feels duty bound to help others fulfill their potential.

"I'm honoured and humbled to receive the Emerging Leadership Award, and I share it with everyone who has supported me on my journey. Thank you for recognising my service to Australian patients who otherwise could not get access to life saving treatments. I also wish to acknowledge all nominees who are equally deserving of these awards."
